The Otto and Magdalene Ackermann Nature Preserve offers natural beauty and discoveries, whether you visit for a casual walk or for a full day of exploration. There are trails and natural areas as well as historical man-made features of interest. Visitors enjoy the Preserve's wildlife, birds, wildflowers, and scenery.

The Preserve is predominantly deciduous forest, and contains a former stone quarry, wooded slopes, and a forested floodplain of a tributary to Brush Creek.

HISTORY

Otto and Magdalene Ackermann married in their native Germany. They came to the United States, and settled in Wilkinsburg before moving with their children to Irwin. The Ackermanns loved nature, and purchased land to make up the 58 acre preserve near Ardara starting in 1939. They never intended to live there, but visited for bird watching, nature study, hikes and picnicking. Eventually they opened the property to the public as a nature preserve.

Otto was a lepidopterist, assembling what was believed to be at that time one of the largest butterfly collections in the world. Otto often collected eggs and raised butterflies through the stages of metamorphosis.

Over the years, Otto and Magdalene's children and their respective families continued to maintain the nature preserve for their own use and public enjoyment. After most of the extended family eventually moved away from the area, the five Ackermann children donated the land to ensure its conservation in perpetuity.

With the 2009 donation of the land, each of the children also contributed funds for maintaining the Preserve. Since then, the Ackermann family has continued to visit and contribute toward upkeep of the Preserve, and has furnished much historical information about the property.




